




5 Ways to present character

Katniss Everdeen is a strong-willed, seventeen-year old hunter in a dystopian America who wants to keep her sister safe.

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Translate to Cosplay:

Scalvia risks her life to save Lykke in Dreadlands: Wolf Moon

She is confident, fierce, and loyal.

Show your character's inner strength



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Character shown

Get to know them on the outside first.

- Reader Experience Through Senses
- Emphasize particular physical trait
- Reveal inside from outside



Introducing the Character

Show & Tell Time

- Laugh
- Clothes
- Walk or Move
- Gestures
- Objects held
- Food & Drinks
- Voice tone
- Skin texture
- Hair scent

- Speech style

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Text vs. Subtext

"What he said was very generous, but he kept checking to see how it was going over."

"His glances belied his words."

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Translate to Cosplay:

Elastigirl is a superhero.

She hides her identity in costume.


She has an alter ego in real life.

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Authorial Interpretation

This is indirect & telling to reveal character.

- Appearance
- Speech
- Action
- Thought

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Pros of indirect method

Free to move in time and space.

Free to know anything you choose (regardless of character's knowledge).

Godlike to tell reader what you feel.

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Cons of indirect method

- Less immediacy
- Less vividness of detail
- Reader can't judge for themselves.

With this method, we learn more about the narrator's attitude then the character's interpretations.

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When do I use Author Interpretation?

To convey large amounts of information in a short time, it's best to tell through the indirect method.

Do not use to describe human change, which requires action and immediacy of scene.

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Example: Peter Pan, by J.M. Barrie

All children, except one, grow up. They soon know that they will grow up, and the way Wendy knew was this. One day when she was two years old she was playing in a garden, and she plucked another flower and ran with it to her mother. I suppose she must have looked rather delightful, for Mrs. Darling put her hand to her heart and cried, "Oh, why can't you remain like this for ever!" This was all that passed between them on the subject, but henceforth Wendy knew that she must grow up. You always know after you are two. Two is the beginning of the end.

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Translate to Cosplay:

- Mash up characters
- Interpret characters
- Create your own characters
- Piece together from thrift stores
- Sew or build your own
- Buy premade at a costume store
- Hire a seamstress to build or sew for you

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Contradiction is key

Conflicting methods of presenting character to the reader.

- Cliche appearance
- Contradictory action
- Opposing thoughts
- Betraying speech

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- Looks like Spidey
 But Spidey is reading
 And he's reading Charlotte's Web
 Of course, he's crying.

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STOCK & FLAT CHARACTERS



Flat characters:

Defined by a single idea or quality. May exist only to fulfill a function. Reader knows little about them.

Shake them up with contradiction between one or more of the other types of character reveals.

Like "Movie Extras": Delivery Boy, Waitress...etc.



Stock characters:

Present a single idea or quality. May satire human types. Are not lifelike or complex characters.

Shake them up by giving them desire, motive, or wants.

Types: absent-minded professor, rich widow, rock wannabe, naive girl, evangelist.
