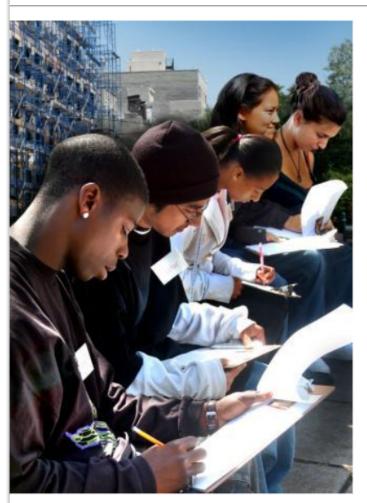

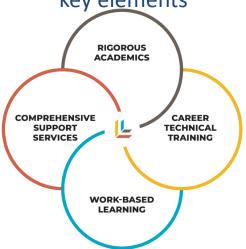

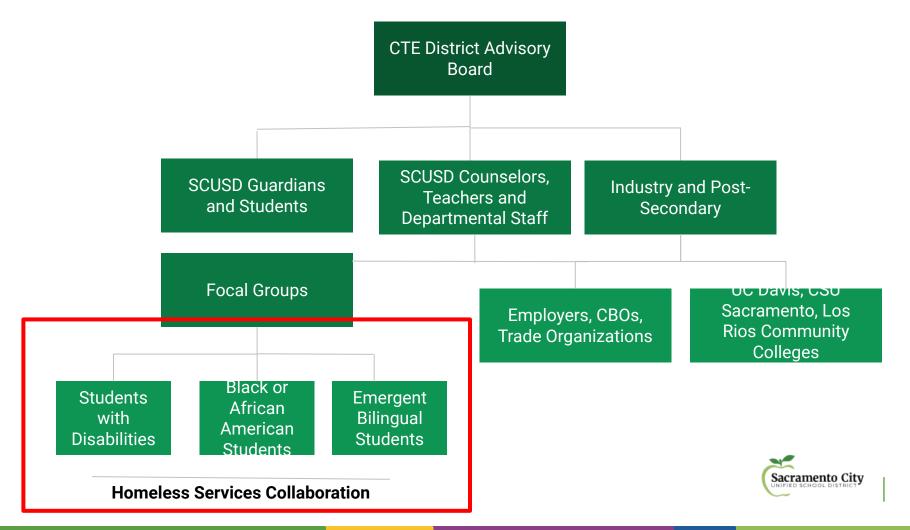

CTE and Homeless Student Services Collaboration

2020-2021 Four-Year Graduation Rate Comparison

CTE Concentrators vs. All Students Experiencing Homelessness (SEH)

96%

4-Year Graduation Rate of SEH who are CTE Concentrators* 68%

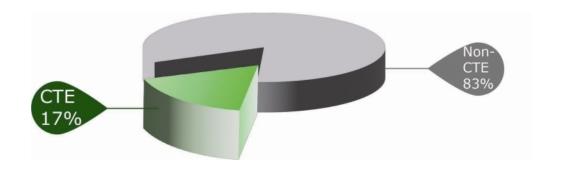
Youth without a high school diploma are 4.5x more likely to experience homelessness later in life.

In SCUSD, only <u>60%</u> of students experiencing homelessness graduate high school.



Data Deep Dive

- Only 68 out of 399 SEH in high school are in enrolled in CTE classes.
- Only 19 out of 107 SEH in 10th grade are in enrolled in CTE classes.
- That's ~17% of all 10th grade SEH.



Continuous Improvement Project

- Analyze Data
- Convene action teams at high school sites to analyze data and strategize about how to connect more 9th grade students to CTE
- Work with counselors and 9th grade academy teachers to conduct individual outreach to all students

Preliminary Results

- 43 out of 60 9th grade SEH at two focus high schools are enrolled in CTE pathways for 25/26 school year.
- That's ~71% of SEH in 9th grade who received 1-1 outreach that are now enrolled in CTE.



CCR Future Innovations!

- Partnering with our community to provide extended learning for students in the summer of 2025
 - Pride Industries Congressional Grant to support 80
 Students with Disabilities.
 - SCOE to support 60 Multilingual, general education and African American or Black students and Homeless Youth
- Granted K12 Strong Workforce grant to support CTE Extended learning for priority populations: SWD, emergent bilingual students, African American or Black, Homeless Youth with a heavy emphasis on supporting Homeless Youth.
- 180 students in 2025-26 will receive Green Career Certifications, PPE, and training through California Mobility Center.
- Partnering with Sacramento City College, MADE Studios,
 California Mobility Center for future opportunities, American
 Education for Indigenous CTE Day in Fall of 2025.
- 9th grade summer enrichment (Science/Math)

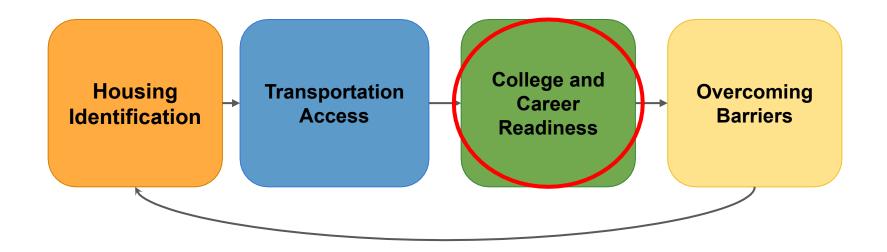

Connecting MKV Students to College & Career Education and Services: Promising Practices

HETAC Mini-grant with Career Focus

Merced COE leveraged a grant program funded by SDCOE HETAC to help MKV youth complete high school and access career opportunities.

Program addressed immediate needs while building pathways to stability with one-onone support, financial assistance, and paid work experiences

The structure ensured students could pursue workforce training without the rigid structures of traditional career programs.
