














# District Liaisons: Who Are They?

Reason for Need of Transportation Assistance: The Family currently resides in their car and cannot stay at the same address every night. The district is unable to provide district transportation.

Miles to School: 4.4 miles District of Residence: Redding / Shasta Union High School District

Transportation Plan: I, Parent Name, have received 1 \$50 and 1 \$10 gas card from Enterprise Elementary School District for a total of \$60. Enterprise Elementary School District and Enterprise High School will alternate each month on providing gas cards. Gas cards will transport the above-mentioned children to and from Enterprise High School, Parsons Junior High, and Rother Elementary. Please note that if all children are not in attendance on any given day, the length of time transportation is calculated will be extended. Two round trips are 17.6 miles. This is \$3.87 per day at \$0.22 (IRS variable mileage reimbursement rate). These gas cards will provide transportation from \$ept 9, 2024, to \$ept 27, 2024, with \$3.25 remaining to be applied to October.

# Relationships Building Takes Time and Patience



#### Relationship building takes consistency

- Families are often experiencing stress and chaos
- Keep showing up even when they can't/don't
- Quick check-ins show you still care
- Often simply being present is enough to provide comfort in the struggle and motivation to strive for better

#### Relationships are the key to success

- · Between on-site staff and students
- Between on-site staff and families
- Between school and community













# Building Trust: Overcoming Barriers



#### **Barriers to Trust Can Include:**

- History of difficult relationships
- Previous negative school experiences
- Previous failed support systems
- Feelings of shame

Trust takes years to build, seconds to break and forever to repair













# Trust-Building Principles

#### We can't help families until they trust us, so

No judgement

Respect confidentiality

Begin by meeting families where they are

Follow their agenda, not yours

Provide physical resources (food, clothing, hygiene, laundry)

Offer assistance with applications, paperwork, etc.

Allow space for pride

#### You don't have to have all the answers

Your fallibility makes you more relatable


